I have Survey'd and Laid out unto Thomas Brown in the Township of Hopewell in the County of Lancaster, on the West Side of the Susquehanna River One Thousand and Eleven Acres of Land with allowance of 6 p Cent Beginning at a Nicker a Corner of Jacob Hubbers Land Thence North forty three degrees Easterly four hundred and forty nine perches to a Locust Thence South forty seven Degrees Easterly Two hundred and seventy three perches to a white oak Thence South Thirty Degrees Westerly Two hundred and Twenty perches to a post Thence South forty Degrees Westerly One hundred and Thirteen perches to a Black Oak South Thirty Degrees Westerly One hundred and forty eight perches to a White Oak Thence North Seventy Degrees Westerly Two hundred and four perches to a Black Oak in the Line of the S<sup>r</sup> Hubbers Land Then by the S<sup>r</sup> Land North Ten Degrees Westerly Two hundred and Twenty eight perches to the place of Beginning
