Mo. 1786 for Henry Baumgartner In pursuance of a Warrant dated the 3d. of October 1785. D within the Blue lines Represents part of a larger Tract of 39as. & 133 perches & Allowance, which was Originally Surveyed by William Matthews late D.S. on the 24th. of the 3d. Mo. 1773 for Jacob Hess. In pursuance of a Warrant for 50as. dated the 18th. day of February 1773. The whole Resurveyed by the Old lines, & Divided as above the 25th. day of October A. Do. 1802. and a small piece of Vacancy added where the letter E is placed at the Request of Tobias Hartman the present owner — who is desirous of having the whole included in one patent — Containing in the whole by the said Resurvey, as above set forth two hundred and Sixteen acres & one hundred and fifty nine perches and the usual allowance &c.
