NOTE. The above two tracts were returned to the owner (as noted on the back of this draft) who neglected to forward to Land Office. I return you the original in preference to a copy to corroborate the age of Survey, viz on first warrant, deducting S. Reigert's interference 174^{ac} 133^{ps} & Allow. and on the second, less Roland Perry's interference 230^{ac} 80^{ps} & Allow. I have made no recalculation of the original returns, but have examined the above interferences and most of the lines, upon the ground, and find them very accurate & well defined considering the great lapse of time.

The land is mostly cleared, and divided among the following persons, viz William Reynolds, John Hughs, John H. Dopp, & A. J. Goodfellow. The precise date of improvement I am not able to state.
