(Note.) All the land embraced in the above Survey is unimproved, and for many years claimed by John Graff who has long since departed this life, but in his life time had an improvement made on the west end of part of the same land, and continued a tenant on it and cleared a quantity of land around the house, one of the sons of said deceased William Graff claimed this land by virtue of said improvement about five years since he sold all the improvement with some timber land to four different persons, and made Deed to some of them, the several lots were all regularly surveyed off with lines and corners made, all running through timber land, and including timber land in each lot, Mr. Mc Gough by this operation concluded Mr. Graff had defined his boundary by his lines, takes out his warrant for the residue of the unimproved land, and lays it out the same as above respecting all Graff's sales but one to Peter Hensich of near 100^{ac} of woodland which is taken in the above Survey, the sale to said thereof was made to Hensich last spring, this statement I believe to be truly correct &
