In pursuance of two warrants under the hand of Richard Hill, Isaac Norris & James Logan, Commissioners of Property and under the Seal of the Province. One bearing date the Twelfth day of September Anno 1715. Requiring me to survey unto Owen Roberts of the City of Philad^a Gent the quantity of five hundred acres of land in this Province by him Purchased of Thomas Palmer and William Palmer, as appears by Indentures of Lease and Release Dated the 29th & 30th days of July Anno 1715. The other (of the two warrants) bearing date the 25th day of January 1715/16 for surveying to Evan Owen of the said City four hundred and ninety acres of land in this Province. In right of five hundred acres Granted by the Proprietary to George Whitehead wherewith the said Evan Owen by means of several conveyances was Legally Invested and which he has since granted to the said Owen Roberts by Deeds of Lease & Release.

Dated the 17th & 18th days of March Anno-1717. There was surveyed and set to the said Owen Roberts on the first day of April in the year 1718 a certain Tract of land situate on the north east Branch of Brandywine Creek in the County of Chester beginning at a post in a line of Jonathan Wynns land and Running by the same west one hundred seventy two perches then by vacant land on the same course two hundred & eight perches to another corner post. Then north north west by the land of James Logan four hundred and eighty perches to a Chestnut oak. Then east by a line of marked Trees three hundred & eighty perches to a black oak. Then by a line of marked Trees south south east four hundred & eighty perches to the place of beginning. Containing One thousand & fifty acres. Certified at Philadelphia this 10th day of April 1718.
