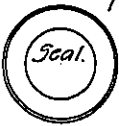


Pennsylvania 55

By the Commission^{rs} of Property

Whereas the late Commissioners by two warr^{ts} both bearing date the 6th of the 2^d moth 1702. Granted to Joseph Kirt to take up twenty five acres of land in y^e City Liberties for and in behalf of Rich^d Wood and William Lovel in right and as part of 1250 acres Originally purchased by Rich^d Collins as also 225 acres of land remaining untaken up of the 5^d Purchase to be laid out according to y^e Method of Townships. And Whereas Isaac Norris hath since by Deeds dated y^e 26th & 27th days of March 1711. Purchased of the Heir of the said Lovel all the 5^d W^{rs} Lovel's Right being one full Moiety or half part of the 5^d Original Purchase of 1250 acres & has thereupon requested us to grant him a separate warr^t for his moiety of the whole 250 acres remaining to be taken up (the 5^d warr^t as is alledged not being executed) as well of that to be taken up in the City Liberties as of the other Remained. These therefore are to authorize & require thee (in case the 5^d warr^{ts} be not executed) to survey or cause to be survey'd to the 5^d Isaac Norris twelve acres and a half of land in y^e 5^d Liberties beyond Skunkkill, or ten acres on this side of the said River in either place as it may be most conveniently found vacant and the Remained^e of one hundred & twenty five acres, y^e 5^d Liberty Land being first deducted out of it, according to the method of Townships where it has not been already survey'd nor taken up nor seated by y^e Indians, & make returns thereof into the Secretaries Office. Given under our hands & y^e Seal of the Province at Philadelphia the 30th day of the 5th moth 1712.
