



In pursuance of a Warrant for 400 Acres of land dated the 21st day of May 1811. was surveyed on the 3rd day of June 1811 for Samuel Butler (McIlwright) the above described tract of land containing 438 Acres and 83-pitches and allowance of six per cent for Roads &c^s Situate in the township of Cussewago and County of Crawford
 Jacob Herrington D. J. S.

Note - At the time of making the survey Samuel Butler was actually residing on the land above described

I, Jacob Herrington Deputy Surveyor of the County of Crawford, do hereby officially Certify and make known that at the time of making the survey on a Warrant in the name of Samuel Butler there was a house fit for habitation of man - and at least ten acres of land cleared, fenced, and cultivated - grain appeared to have been raised regularly. Mr Butler was a single man - and was then living in the house & appeared to be making improvements

Went to the office 17th Nov. 1811 together with another in the name John Davis Esquire

IN TESTIMONY that the above is a copy of the original remaining on file in the Department of Internal Affairs of Pennsylvania, made conformably to an Act of Assembly approved the 16th day of February, 1833, I have hereunto set my Hand and caused the Seal of said Department to be affixed at Harrisburg, this eighteenth day of January 1904
