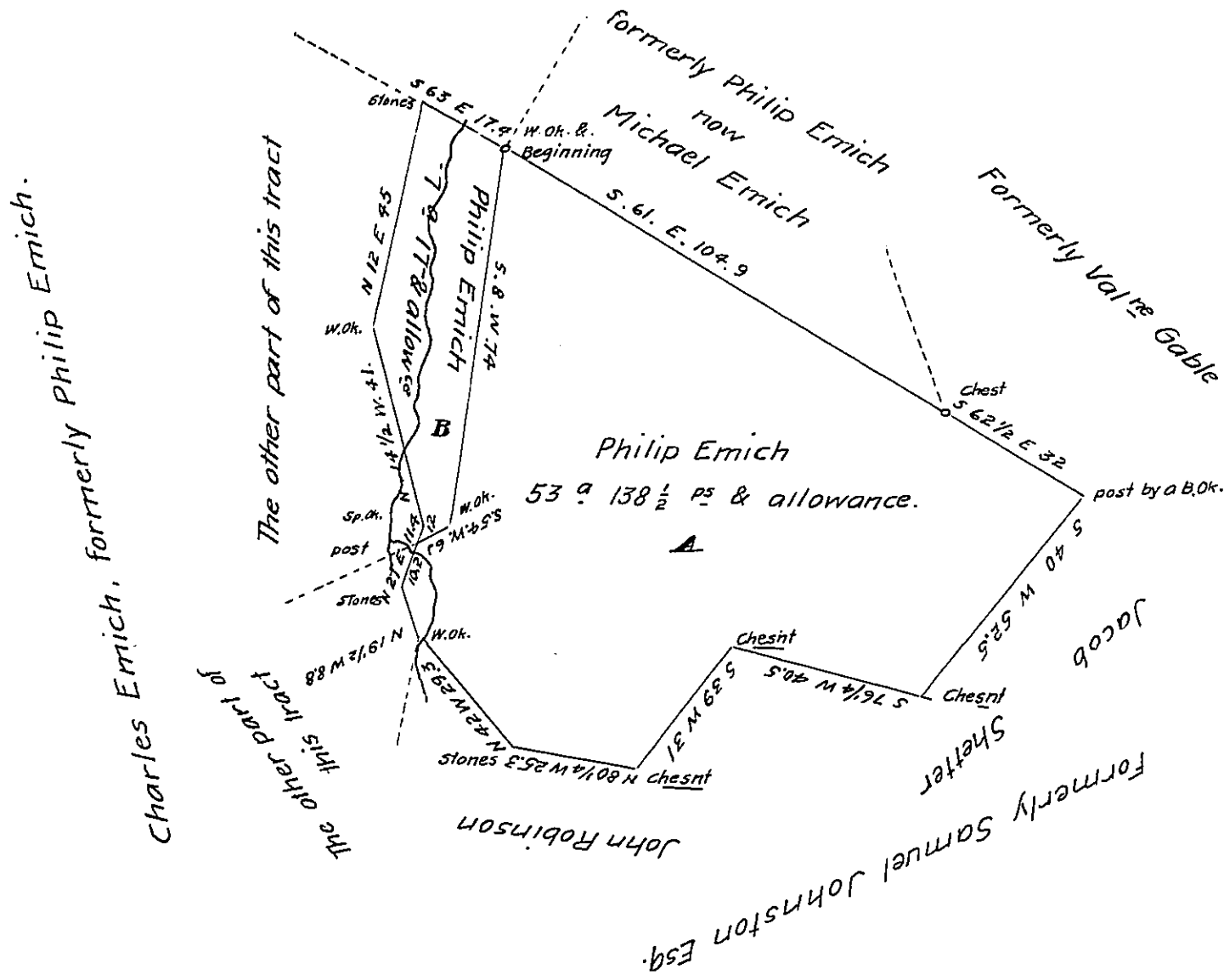


Jacob & Peter Stuck



Situate in Codorus Township, York County. The part A containing as

a. obl. ve set forth 53<sup>as</sup> & 138 1/2<sup>ps</sup> an obl. allowance; being a part of a larger tract obl. 66 1/4<sup>as</sup> of land, which was originally surveyed on the 24<sup>th</sup> day of the 5<sup>th</sup> mo 1775 by William Matthews late D.S. in pursuance of a warrant dated the 9<sup>th</sup> of march 1775, granted to Philip Emich for 50<sup>a</sup>. The part B containing as above set forth 79.17<sup>ps</sup> & allowance, being also a part of a larger tract of 189<sup>as</sup> 103<sup>ps</sup> & allowance of land, which was originally surveyed on the 7<sup>th</sup> of 4<sup>th</sup> 1767 by William Matthews late D.S. in pursuance of two warrants, one for 60<sup>as</sup> dated 27<sup>th</sup> of January 1757, the other for 100<sup>as</sup> dated march 6<sup>th</sup> 1767 both granted to Philip Emich; the parts A and B being both divided off from the said larger tracts on the 23<sup>rd</sup> day of march 1810 for the present owner Michael Emich, at whose request they are now returned for confirmation this 14<sup>th</sup> day of May Anno Domini 1810.
