ance of Six Pr. Cent for roads &c. Surveyed the 14th day of September A. D. 1792 for John Hersh and Margaret his wife (late Margaret Miller) in Trust for the Heirs of John Miller Deced (she the said Margaret being the Executrix of the last Will and Testament of the said. John Miller Deced as aforesaid. It being part and parcel of a larger Tract of 207^{ac} Formerly surveyed unto a Certain Herman Zenn by virtue of a warrant Dated the 26th Day of January A. D. 1737 under Certain Conditions in the said War^t Mentioned, Which conditions not having been complied with by the said Herman Zenn the said war^t and Survey made in pursuance thereof are become utterly void as in and by the said War^t remaining in the Surveyor Generals Office may more fully appear. AND WHEREAS afterwards in and by a Certain Other War^t Dated the 27th Day of May A. D. 1746 upon application made by a certain other John Miller the Surveyor General was then required to except and receive into his office the survey of the 5^d Tract of Land and to make return into the Secretaries Office for the use and behoof of him the said John Miller. And It Appears that the right in and to the said 3^{ac} & 127^{ps} and allowance being since Lawfully vested in the said John Miller Deceased as in and by a certain Bill of Sale made & legally executed (for the same) to and between Jacob Coffroth and the said John Miller deced dated the 7th day of September A. D. 1779 may more fully appear reference thereto being duly had.
