



By VIRTUE of a warrant from the Hon^{ble} Proprietaries bearing Date the Seventeenth Day of May Anno Domⁱ 1738. I have Surveyd and Laid out unto Jacob Snevely in the Township of Hopewell in the County of Lancaster on the west side Sasquehanna River five hundred and fifty ^{Two & a half} ~~three~~ Acres of Land with allowance of six p Cent Beginning at a hick^y standing in the Line of Joseph Cronleton's Land Thence South fifty Degrees westerly five hundred and ^{fifteen} ~~sixteen~~ pches to a post Thence North forty Degrees west one hundred and four perches to a Black Oak a Corn^r of William Maxwell's Land Thence North fifty Degrees Easterly Two hundred and twenty four perches to a Black Oak Thence north forty Degrees Westerly - One hundred & forty three perches to a White Oak Thence north fifty Degrees Easterly Two hundred and Eighteen pches to a post Thence East Thirty Nine pches to a Hickery Thence - North forty Eight Degrees Easterly forty three perches to a Hickery Thence South forty Degrees Easterly Two hundred and - twenty two perches and a half to the place of Beginning
