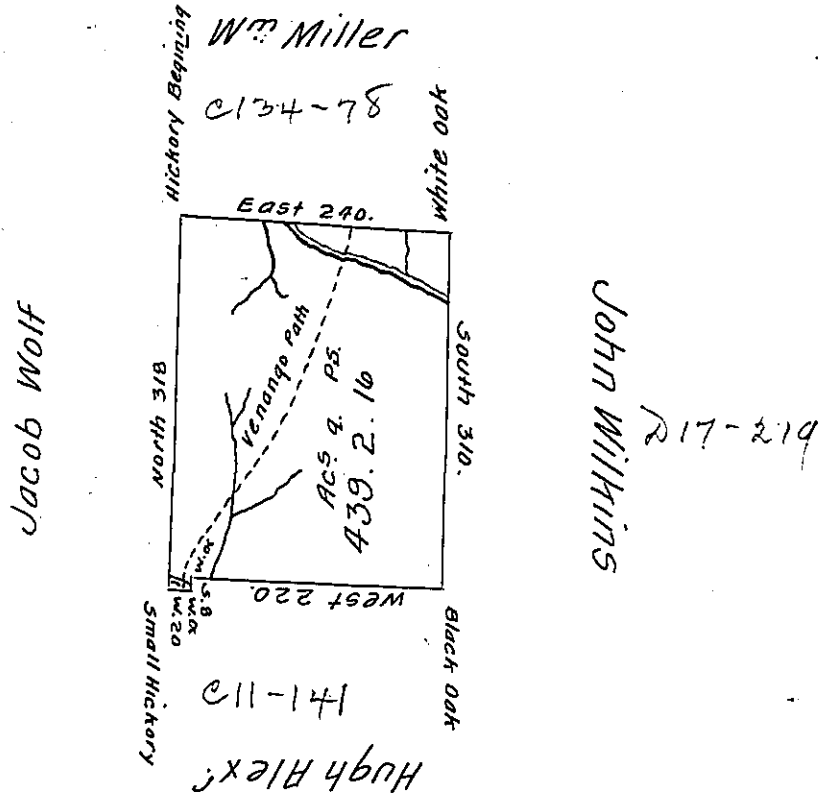

The above is a Draught of a Survey made Aprile the 2<sup>d</sup> day 1794. in pursuance of a Warrant Granted to John Wilkins Ju<sup>r</sup> for 400 Acres of Land Dated the tenth of Feb<sup>y</sup> 1794. Situate upon the forks of the Cushuske and Venango Path about 12 Miles from Pittsburgh on the North West Side of the Alleghany River including the Head Waters of a S<sup>e</sup> Stream Emptying into the Ohio - Called the Indian Incamping Ground. Containing four Hundred and thirty nine Acres one half and Sixteen poles together with the Usual Allowance of Six p<sup>r</sup> Cent for Roads.
