

10^bc 1736 Samuel Steel preferd a petition to the Prop^r complaining on a survey Jn^e Churchman had made to W^m Waugh w^{ch} in his petition he affirmed he had improved by the Prop^rs Order I wrote to Jn^e Churchman desiring an Acct of the Affair & sent the Letter by Sam^l Steel. John Churchman was at home several days after Steels return he is not sure of having seen him but he heard nothing of the Letter & soon after he went a journey & was absent from home several weeks & at Philad^a before his Return where he was informed the Letter I sent by Sam^l Steel was by accid^t found dropt on the Road & brought to his Wife.

12 m^e 1st. Asto the Case he says When he was on the spot to survey W^m Waughs Land he sent for sam^l steel who came to the place it appears that sam^l steel & Jn^e McClanaghan have sold for a Considerⁿ a Tract of Land for a meeting house without having any right to any Land at all Isaac Taylor indeed made a survey to Tho^s John without Warr^t & Jn^e Churchman proposed to leave the breadth of 50 per more Southward for an additⁿ. If Steel would apply for a Warr^t w^{ch} he refused.
