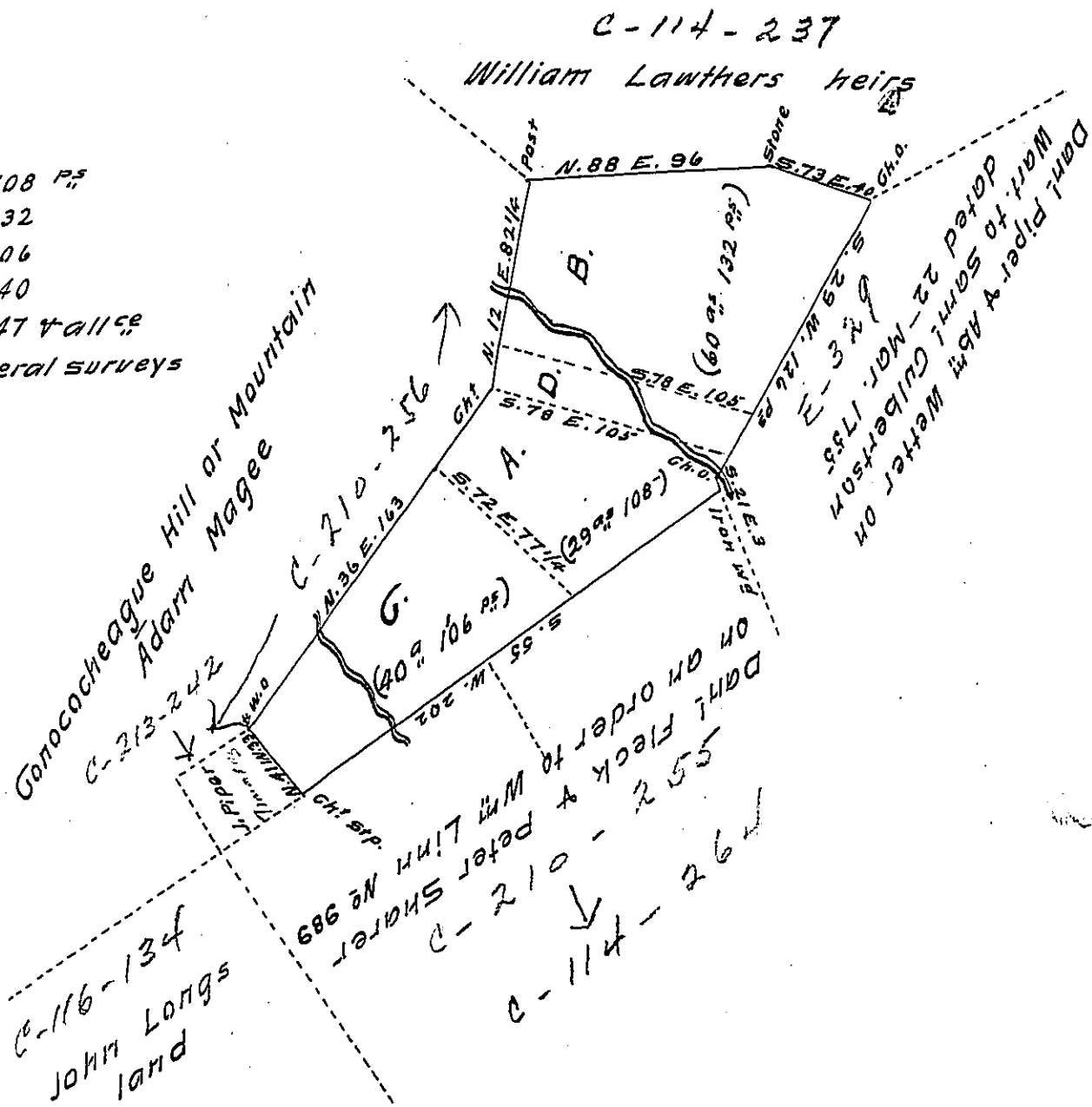

 acres forty seven perches & allowance of six per cent for roads &c.  
 surveyed 21<sup>st</sup> ~~October~~ <sup>August</sup> 1829. In pursuance of a contract with the Board  
 of Property for ascertaining surveying & returning unpatented lands under  
 Proprietary rights &c And by virtue of an order of survey dated the 30<sup>th</sup>  
 October 1766 No. 1057 granted to James Cunningham for 200 acres in  
 Ambersons Valley on the North<sup>W</sup> of John Long and W<sup>m</sup> Linn including two  
 small streams coming out of the Gonococheague Mountain.*

*The above tract is covered by the following office rights to wit. The  
 part marked A covered by a warrant to William Ward dated 23<sup>d</sup> August 1787.  
 The part marked B covered by a warrant to William Ward dated 19<sup>th</sup> Feb<sup>r</sup>  
 1794. The part C covered by a warrant to Joseph Brearly (in right of W<sup>m</sup> Ward)  
 dated 19<sup>th</sup> October 1808- & D is an intermediate space not properly cov-  
 ered by the surveys on A and B.*

 the year 1768 by adjoining surveys.*
