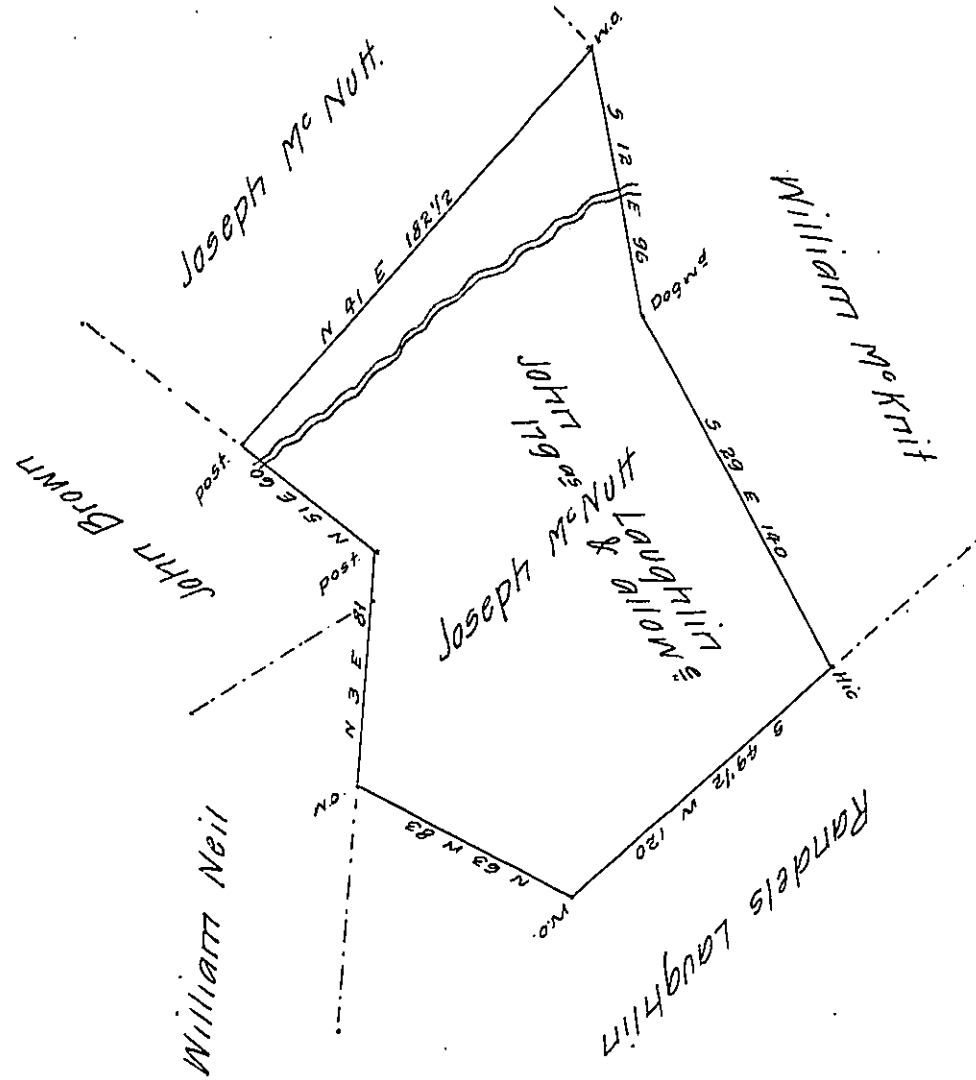


FORM NO 1.



The above was surveyed to John Laughlin on the 6th October 1802 By warrant of the 8th May 1802 And is the same upon which I have laid the warrant of Joseph Mc Nutt a return whereof is herewith enclosed. It would appear from the above that Joseph Mc Nutt should adjoin the above survey. It must however be a mistake for the land said to be Joseph Mc Nutts has been held and occupied for a great many years under a warrant to John Parks of an earlier date than Mc Nutts the title to which is vested in the heirs of Alex^r Ray a survey of which I made on the same day I surveyed the above for Mc Nutt. It is said that there was a survey made upon Mc Nutts warrant before the Revolution but there is nothing official appears in my office except from the adjainers. I called upon a Mr Joseph Mc Nutt who lives in the neighborhood, to see if he knew any circumstances respecting the land, being as I was informed a relation of the warrantee. he informed ^{me} that he understood his Uncle Joseph Mc Nutt had procured a survey of all or part of the above survey and including the claim of John Parks. that in consequence of the claim of Parks nothing decisive was done, his Uncle was killed some short time afterwards by the Indians. And being a single man his heirs at law were much scattered at the close of the revolutionary war in consequence

IN TESTIMONY that the above is a copy of the original remaining on file in the Department of Internal Affairs of Pennsylvania, made conformably to an Act of Assembly approved the 16th day of February, 1833, I have hereunto set my Hand and caused the Seal of said Department to be affixed at Harrisburg, this twenty-ninth day of January 1909.
