Then surveyed for John Harding 55 acres of land beginning at a marked <sup>plumtree</sup> ~~post~~ standing by Chechester creek and from thence running N. E. 14 perches to a marked ~~post~~ <sup>stair</sup> standing by the cripie or swarp side at the corner of a fence and running along the s<sup>d</sup> fence on severall courses to a marked ~~post~~ and from thence running N 12 degrees W by a line of marked trees 95 perches to a marked whit-oak and from thence running W 65 85 perches to a marked — standing by Chechester creek and from thence running down the s<sup>d</sup> Creek on severall courses to the first mentioned plumtree.

Also one pece of meadow lying on the east side of Chechester creeks mouth joining to the mouth of the s<sup>d</sup> Creek and also to the river running ~~up~~ <sup>up</sup> the river side 50 perches to a marked Ash and from thence running N 18 degrees west ~~to~~ 78 perches to a marked post standing on the fast land by a fence side lying a fence of John Johnson and running along the s<sup>d</sup> fence and meadow side on severall courses to a marked post and from thence running S. S. W 10 perches to a marked post ~~standing~~ standing by the above s<sup>d</sup> Chechester creek containing 16 acres of meadow also on- feild containing 5 acres surveyed of Charles Ashcorn.
