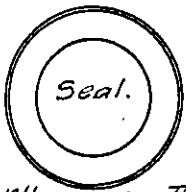

Whereas Thomas Fairman having purchased two thousand five hundred acres of land in Philad<sup>ia</sup> County being one moiety of W<sup>m</sup> Starly's original Purchase of five thousand acres hath besides 1300 acres already resurvey'd by warrant from us to Alexander Edwards and Job Bates, disposed of and sold off the remaining 1200 acres to sundry persons now possessed ye of who want sufficient Confirmation: These therefore are to require thee to survey the <sup>se</sup> remaining twelve hundred acres of land as now divided <sup>to</sup> and possessed by the several under purchasers aforesaid and make returns thereof into the General Surveyors office at Philadelphia where this warrant is to remain and a copy thereof to be deliv'd to thee certified by the Secretary Given under our hands and the Seal of the office at Philad<sup>ia</sup> 16<sup>th</sup> 9<sup>th</sup> mo<sup>th</sup> 1702.
