



Pursuant to a Warrant to me directed by Edward Penington Surveyor General dated the 14th day of the 11th month 1702 to re-survey unto John Surket Two Tracts of Land where said Tracts are contiguous and begining at a black oak by the side of the River Delaware Then North north west by the Corn^rs manner of Pensberry seven hundred eighty three perches to a post in the meadow being the line of Phineas Pemberton's Land Thence by the said Line ~~North~~ ^{South} forty seven deg^s West one hundred sixty perches to a post Then by said Pemberton's Land and the Land of Joseph Large South South east Two hundred sixty one perches to a post Then by William Dungs Land north east and by east fifty two perches to a small maple in a swamp Thence by the said Dungs Land ^{sse} a cross a creek Three hundred seventy two perches to a spanish oak on the southerly side of the said Creek Then by the said Creek side south west 20 perches to the River Delaware Then up the River Delaware South 58 9/16 E Twelve perches Then South eighty eight degrees east twenty eight perches Then South sixty nine deqrs east thirty six perches Then South seventy three degrees east forty five perches Then South seventy degrees east Twenty four perches to the place of Begining containeing five hundred thirty six

acres and thirty five perches Resurveyed and certified the 21 day of the 1st month 1702 p
