

Pennsylvania S.S.

Whereas the Members of the free Society of Traders in Pennsylvania having purchased Twenty Thousand acres of Land in this Province our late Proprietary & Governour, William Penn Esqr. Granted them his Warrant dated the Twenty sixth day of the Twelfth Month 1682 Directed to the then Surveyr. Genl. requiring him to Cause the same to be Survey'd or laid out to the sd. Society. By virtue whereof some part of the sd. Land was Survey'd and the Residue remains unlocated and whereas by an Act of Genl. Assembly of this Province all the sd. Land with the Appurtenances are vested and Settled in us as Trustees with Power to sell the same for ye use of the sd. Society and we having sold to Jeremiah Langhorne Two Thousand Acres of the sd unlocated Land and in pursuance of the Directions of the sd Act of Assembly have Settled and Adjusted in the Surveyr. Genl's Office of this Province the True Accot. of the Lands already Survey'd and laid out in Right of the sd. Society and Secured ye Payment of the Arrears of Quitrent due for ye same to ye Proprietor of this Province. These are therefore to request thee In pursuance of ye aforesd. Original Warrnt of ye sd late Proprietary and by ye Authority of ye sd Act of Genl. Assembly to Survey or cause to be Survey'd unto ye sd. ~~to~~ Jeremiah Langhorne according to ye established and usual methods heretofore practised for taking up of Lands in this Province and not otherwise the sd. quantity of Two Thousand Acres and make Return thereof into ye sd Surveyr Genl's Office. Given under our hands and Seals at Philadelphia the Twenty fifth Day of March Anno Dom. 1724.
