William Penn Absolute Proprietor & Govern^r
in Chief of the Province of Pensilvania and
County^s annexed

At the Request of Richard Crosby That I would grant
him to take up two hundred and thirty four Acres the Remain-
der of his Purchase (as he says) untaken up, also That I
would grant him to take up one hundred and Ninety acres
w^{ch} wth 10 Acres deducted for Liberty land is y^e Complem^t
unsold of five hundred Acres bought by him of John &
John and Thomas Wynne purchasers of 5000 Acres.

These are to require thee forthwth to Survey or cause to be
Survey'd unto the Sd Rich^d Crosby according to y^e Meth-
od of Townships by me appointed the Sd two parcels
in one Tract of four hundred twenty and four Acres
of Land in this Province that has not been already
Survey'd nor taken up nor concealed nor is seated by the
Indians, and make Returns thereof into my Secretaries
Office. Which Survey w^{ll} duly made and returned Shall
(if Seated and improved wth in twelve Months after date
thereof, & it further appearing y^t the Sd Remanders are
not already taken up) be confirmed to him his Heirs and
assigns for ever. Given at Philad^{ia} 26. 1^{mo} 1701.
