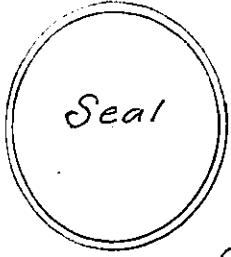

William Penn Absolute Proprietary & Govern<sup>r</sup> in Chief  
of the Province of Pensilvania & Counties Annexed

At the Request of Jn<sup>o</sup> Parker That I would grant him to take  
up five hundred Acres of Land in right of Mary Southwo<sup>rth</sup> Purchaser  
of five hundred Acres These are to require thee forthwith to Survey  
or cause to be Survey'd unto him the S<sup>d</sup> Jn<sup>o</sup> Parker the Said Number  
of five hundred Acres (according to ye Method of Townships  
by me appointed) of Land in this Province not already Survey'd nor  
taken up nor Conceal'd, nor Seated by the Indians, He Seating and  
Improving the Same within twelve Months after the Date of  
Survey of w<sup>ch</sup> make Returns into my Secretaries Office,  
Given under my hand and Seal at Philad<sup>ia</sup> the 3<sup>d</sup> day of the  
7<sup>th</sup> Month 1701.

To Edwd Pennington Surveyor Gen<sup>l</sup>  
of ye Province of Pensilvania & Territories

Obliterated

Mem<sup>dum</sup> that ye Liberty Land being ~~already~~ already  
granted viz 8 Acres there is but 492 Acres to be laid out to him  
IN TESTIMONY that the above is a copy of the original remaining on file in  
the Department of Internal Affairs of Pennsylvania, made  
conformably to an Act of Assembly approved the 16th day of  
February, 1833, I have hereunto set my Hand and caused  
the Seal of said Department to be affixed at Harrisburg,  
this 26<sup>th</sup> day of October 1909
