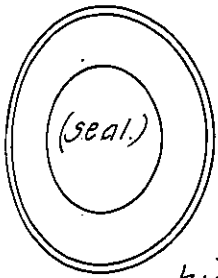

William Penn Absolute Proprietary & Govern: in
Chief of the Province of Pensilvania and Counties Annexed.

At the Request of Christopher Pennock That I would grant

him to take up five hundred Acres of Land in right of Francis and
George Collet the S^d C. Pennocks father in law, who bequeathed his
whole Right therein to ye S^d Christopher and his Sons. These are to re-
quire thee forthwith to Survey or cause to be Survey'd to the S^d Christ-
opher Pennock ~~through~~ According to the Method of Townships by me appoint-
ed the S^d Number of five hundred Acres of Land in this Province where it has
not been already Survey'd nor taken up nor is concealed nor seated by the
Indians, and make Return thereof into my Secretaries Office. Given under
my hands and Seal at Philad^a the 20th of the ~~fourth~~ tenth month 1704
