



Surveyed by virtue of a warrant from william penn [obliterated] day of the 10<sup>th</sup> month 1700 and by virtue of an order from Jacob Taylor to me directed I have Surveyed a hundred and fifty acres in Right of the Haineses to Joseph Samuel beginning at a white oak standing on the South side of a branch of delaware caled Sockcutk then North East one hundred and thirty three perches to a post and stone then South East one hundred and thirty two perches to a black oak by vacated Land then South west one hundred and thirty three perches by vacated Land to a post then north west by Isack Samuels Land one hundred and thirty ~~one~~<sup>two</sup> perches to the place of beginning Containing One hundred and fifty acres of Land with the usual allowance for hiways and Roads Surveyed on the first day of May 1730 by me John Chapman Deputy Surveyor.

Let this Survey be examined for its supposed greater y<sup>r</sup> here described
