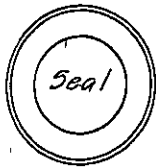


Pensilvania

William Penn Absolute Proprietary and Govern<sup>r</sup> in chief of the  
Province of Pensilvania and counties Annexed.

At the request of Christopher Pennock Attorney for Samuel Taverner, That I would grant him to take up five hundred acres of land in right of his s<sup>d</sup> constituent purchaser of one Thousand acres, These are to required~~d~~ thee forthwith to survey or cause to be surveyed unto him the said number of acres of land not yet taken up nor concealed nor cleared by the Indians, to be laid out according to the Method of Townships by me appointed. He taking out a patent for the same w<sup>th</sup> in three months after thou shalt make returns thereof into my Secretaries office, w<sup>ch</sup> thou art hereby required to doe with all convenient speed. Given under my hand and seal at Pensbury the 2<sup>d</sup> day of ye 7<sup>th</sup> mo<sup>th</sup> 1700.
