These are to authorize and require thee to survey and lay out ~~it~~ in the right aforesaid ~~the~~ ~~is~~ & according to the method of Townships appointed the said quantity of six hundred and eighty six acres of land in this Province that has not been already surveyed nor taken up nor is concealed nor seated by the Indians, and make returns into the General Surveyors office at Philad<sup>ia</sup> where this warrant is to remain and a copy thereof to be deliv<sup>d</sup> to thee certified by the Secretary. Given under our hands and seal of the Province at Philad<sup>ia</sup> the 20<sup>th</sup> of the 3<sup>d</sup> mo<sup>th</sup> 1706.
