 One other Tract of five hundred acres of land over and above the several  
 grants of 1814. Acres already made to him in right & further in part of the  
 three thousand acres granted to his father Will<sup>m</sup> Asketon's children by the  
 Propriet<sup>r</sup> in England: These are to authorize and require thee to survey and  
 lay out in the right aforesaid, and according to the Method of Townships  
 appointed the said quantity of five hundred acres of land that has not  
 been already survey'd nor taken up nor is concealed nor seated by the  
 Indians and make returns into the General Surveyors Office at Philad<sup>ia</sup>  
 where this Warr<sup>t</sup> is to remain and a copy thereof to be deliv<sup>d</sup> to thee  
 certified by the Secretary. Given under our hands and seal of the  
 Province at Philad<sup>ia</sup> the 15<sup>th</sup> of the 3<sup>d</sup> Mo<sup>th</sup> 1706.
