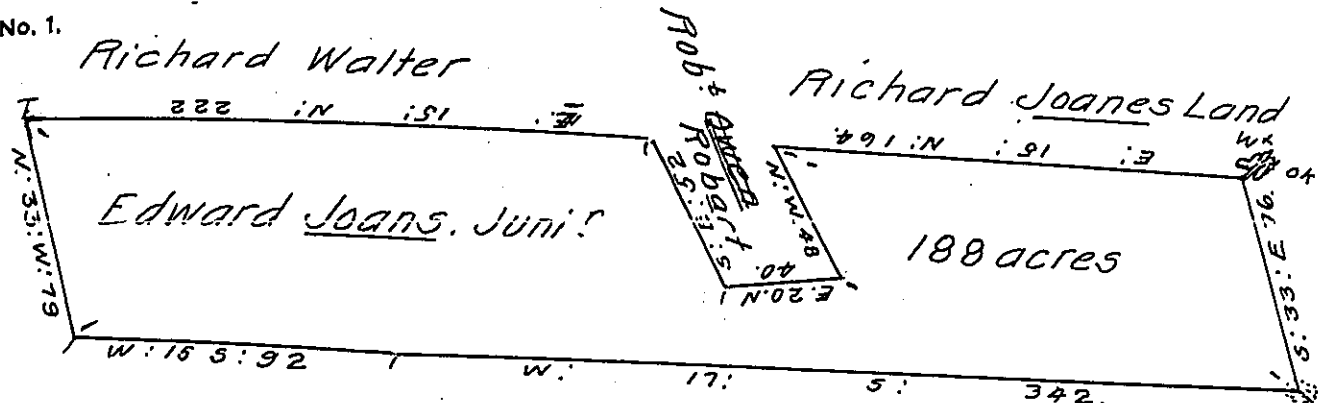

Pursuant to ~~What~~ an order on a Warrant from the Comiss^{rs} directed unto Edward Penington then Survey^r Generall bearing date ye 22^d of ye 10th mo. 1701. I hereby Certiefy that I have Resurveyed the 24th of ye 2^d mo. ^{then} Next Ensuieing a Certaine tract of Land in the Township of Mirion, begining at a stak sett in the ground being in a Line ~~of Robert David.~~ ~~and Edward Joanes~~ ^{thenc.} Land from thenc by the said Edward Joanes Senr's Land by a Line of Marked trees West 15 degrees South 92 p^r to a stak being a Corner deviding it from the said Robert David and Edward Joanes, Senr's Land. from thenc by a Line of Marked trees and ye said ^{Edwards} Land West 17 degrees South 342 perches to stak being a Corner deviding it from the said Edward Joanes Land hard by a great stone: from thenc by a Line of Marked trees deviding it from William Cuartens Land South South East: 76 perches to a whit ok marked being a Corner deviding it from Richard Joanes Land from thenc by a Line of Marked trees and ye same Land East 15 degrees North 164 perches thenc North West by a Line of Marked trees 48 perches thenc East 20 degrees North 40 perches to a whit ok Marked. thenc South East 52 perches thenc by a Line of Marked trees deviding it from ye said Richard Joanes and Richard Walters Land East 15 degrees North 222 perches to a stak in a Line of the said Richard Walters Land. from thenc by a Line of Marked trees and ye same Land North 33 degrees West 79 perches to ye place of begining. Containeing 188 acres of Land and is According to ye bounds above described. Returned into the Generall Survey^rs Office at Philadelphia ye 24 day of ye 5th mo. 1702.
