William Penn, Proprietary and Govern<sup>r</sup> of the Province  
of Pensilvania and Counties Annexed.

At the Request of Joseph Growdon, ~~Agent~~ Agent for the Heirs of George  
Fox, That I would grant him to take up for John Rowse four hundred  
and eight Acres and one third of an Acre of Land in this Province  
being one third part of the 5<sup>d</sup> George Fox's purchase of 1250 Acres  
(Liberty land deducted) bequeathed by the 5<sup>d</sup> George to the 5<sup>d</sup> John  
Rowse & his Children by his last Will and Testam<sup>t</sup>. These are to  
require thee forthwith to survey or cause to be survey'd to the 5<sup>d</sup>  
John Rowse and his Children according to the Method of Townships  
by me appointed the said Number of four hundred and eight acres  
and one third of an Acre of Land in this Province not already surv-  
ey'd, nor taken up nor concealed nor seated by the Indians, and  
make Returns thereof into my Secretaries Office. Given under  
my hand & Seal at Philad<sup>ia</sup> the tenth day of October 1701.
