At the Request of Joseph Pie By his Attorney <sup>Thomas Story</sup> ~~Joseph Story~~  
That I would grant him to take up five hundred Acres of Land in  
right of Samuel Rowles first Purchaser of five Thousand Acres.  
These are to require thee forthwith to Survey or cause to be survey'd  
to the sd Joseph Pie the sd Number of five hundred Acres of Land  
(according to the Method of Townships by me appointed) That has not been  
already Survey'd nor taken up nor concealed nor seated by the Indians  
and make Returns thereof into my Secretaries Office. Given under my  
hand and Seal at Philad<sup>ia</sup> the 29<sup>th</sup> day of 8<sup>br</sup> 1701.
