Whereas by our Consent and Direction a Survey was made on a certain Tract of Land containing One hundred & fifty one Acres & Allowance, Situate in Haycock Township in the County of Bucks, part of the Lottery Land for. ~~the Right to which is now lawfully vested in~~ Christian Gayman of the County of Bucks aforesaid, who hath requested that we would grant him the said Land and agreed to pay to our Use for the same Eighty six pounds with lawful Interest for the same, and the Yearly Quit Rent of one half penny Sterling @ Acre for ever, both to commence from the first Day of March last. These are therefore to authorize and require you to accept and receive into your Office the Survey of the said Tract, and make Return thereof into the Secretaries Office, for the Use and Behoof of the said Christian Gayman in order for further Confirmation, for which this shall be your sufficient Warrant Which Survey, in Case the said Christian Gayman fulfill the above Agreement within one Month after the Date hereof shall be valid otherwise the same is to be void. Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Land Office, by Virtue of a certain Power from the said Proprietaries, at Philadelphia, this thirteenth Day of April Anno Domini One Thousand Seven Hundred and ~~Eighty~~ Sixty nine.
