 Absolute Proprietors of the Province of Pennsylvania, and Counties
 of Newcastle, Kent and sussex on delaware, to Jacob Taylor
 Surveyor General, or to our Surveyor General for the time being.



Whereas, by an agreement made this day between us the said
 Proprietors the said Richard Penn is to have surveyed to him for
 his own proper use and benefit five thousand acres of land in our
 said Province. Wee do hereby authorize and require you to survey
 or cause to be surveyed to him the said Richard Penn his Heirs
 and assigns, One thousand acres of the said land in some one
 place, on land purchased of the Indians, and whereon no persons
 are seated reserving a Quitrent of Twelve pence, the Hundred
 acres. Given under our hands and the lesser seal of the said
 Province at London this 12th day of May 1732.
