You'l not forget to have the time of my application for them Lotts inserted in the right

Because shou'd there be any others laying any Claim to any <sup>of</sup> them, my Time of application will settle the matter at once. I shall remain much Indebted to you for <sup>your</sup> Goodness in assisting me in getting them sur'd.
