Whereas John Stuart of the County of York hath requested that we would ~~grant~~ ~~to take up~~ grant unto him our warrant ~~of land~~ for two hundred & fifty acres joining on both sides Marsh Creek and William Queit Jarrics Hall and John Everat in Cumberland township being part of Thirty Thousand acres of land which by our Warrant of the eighteenth day of June 1741 we directed our then Surveyor General to survey on the Branches of Marsh Creek on the West side of the River Sasquehanna then in the County of Lancaster now York for our own proper Use & the same to return Under the Name & style of our Manor of Maake, And it appearing to us that the said two hundred & fifty acres of land was settled before the issuing our said Warrant for the said Manor. We have notwithstanding condescended & agreed to grant the same to the said John Stuart on the then common Terms the Interest and Quitrent commencing from the first day of March 1740 being the time of settlement of said 250^{ac} ~~in the~~ County of And for which he agrees to pay to our Use, within the Term of six Months from the date hereof, at the rate of Fifteen Pounds Ten Shillings, current Money of this Province, for every hundred acres; and also to pay the yearly Quitrent of One Half penny Sterling for every acre thereof, to us, our Heirs and Assigns forever: These are therefore to authorise and require you to survey, or cause to be surveyed unto the said John Stuart at the place aforesaid, according to the Method of Townships appointed, the said Quantity of Two hundred & fifty acres ~~acres, if not already surveyed or appropriated,~~ and make return thereof into the Secretary's Office, in order for Confirmation; for which this shall be your sufficient Warrant: Which warrant and survey, in case the said John Stuart fulfil the above Agreement within six Months from the date hereof, shall be valid, otherwise void. Given under my Hand, and the seal of the Land Office, by virtue of certain Powers from the said Proprietaries, at Philadelphia, this sixteenth day of April Anno Domini One Thousand seven Hundred and sixty five.
