By the Proprietarys

Whereas by Warrant under the Hand & Seal of our late Father dated the first Day of September 1700 Edward Pennington then Surveyor General of this Province and Territories thereunto belonging was required & commanded (in pursuance of the Primitive Regulation for laying out Lands in this Province) to survey or cause to be surveyed to the proper use & behoof of our said Father & his Heirs Five hundred acres in every Township consisting of Five thousand acres that should be surveyed & generally one-tenth part of all the lands that should be laid out in this Province or Territories;

These are to authorize & require thee to make strict examination what has been done in Pursuance of the above mentioned Warrant and make exact returns of such surveys into the Secretarys office; As also of all other Lands whatsoever that have by warrants heretofore issued, been appropriated to our use. — Given under my Hand & the lesser Seal of our Province, at Philadelphia this eighteenth day of January Anno Dom. 1733
