REMARKS Statistical & Geological

Greatest Length 43 1/2 Miles
Greatest breadth 23 1/2 Miles
Area 177 miles 13,230 acres
Population 55 to the square mile
Geological Formation, of various kinds, with
shales, sandstone, & limestone, the Delaware
River and its tributaries, rising in the
interior. In some places hilly, & the
soil much diversified with many
waterfalls and Mill seats.
Navigation - The Delaware is navigable
for large vessels, and the entrance
of the principal streams with small
craft.
Roads - The great leading roads, are
towards Baltimore, and West Chester.
The interior roads are numerous,
generally very narrow, and very irregular.
There is only one Turnpike partially
improved.
