deliver, and generally all and every other act and acts, thing and
things, device or devices, in the law whatsoever, needful and
necessary to be done in and about the premises, for me and in
my name, to do, execute and perform as fully, largely and
amply, to all intents and purposes as I myself might or could
do, if I was personally present, or as if the matter required
more especial authority than is herein given; and attorney one or
more under him for the purpose aforesaid, to make and consti-
tute, and again at pleasure revoke; ratifying, allowing and hold-
ing, for firm and effectual, all and whatsoever my said attorney
shall lawfully do in and about the premises by virtue hereof.
