HAIL COLUMBIA!

Good day everyone ... it's a beautiful day in Pennsylvania.

Songs have had something to do with Pennsylvania counties--for example, one of the first ever written by Stephen Foster was the Tioga Waltz, named for our northern tier Tioga County. But another county was named for a song... the song title becoming the name of the county. It is Columbia County, and as you might guess, the song was "Hail Columbia", which led the hit parade during the War of 1812 and was written by Pennsylvania's Joseph Hopkinson. In 1813, while the war was still in progress, Columbia County was separated from Northumberland. Danville was selected as its county seat; the town was located along the western boundary. This created dissatisfaction, and by a vote of the citizens, Bloomsburg, in 1845, became the county seat. It is still the only incorporated "town" in the state -- (you can always win a wager, by the way, with that one -- what is the only town in the State? --- Bloomsburg!). Later on, Danville and Montour county became separate entities. During the Civil War an interesting thing occurred-in 1864, 1000 Federal troops were sent in seeking a group of conspirators who were supposed to have erected an anti-federal fort. They never found one. This however is still referred to as the "Fishing Creek Confederacy", an interesting anecdote in Columbia history. One of the Molly Maguires', the group recently re-acquiring fame through a motion picture, was tried in Bloomsburg. Columbia county is one of diversified action--its production of metal and

metal parts and parts for railroads and electric railways are a leading industry of Berwick. The first all-steel railroad cars in the United States were manufactured there and ACF tanks, a contributing force in the winning of World War II, ran off the assembly lines in Columbia County. Anthracite is mined in its borders and 2000 farms make Columbia one of the finest agricultural counties in the State. Before the Revolution, the British and Indians waged war here and the name Catawissa commemorates the site where once stood a large Indian village. Columbia is the site of Bloomsburg State, one of the fine colleges in the Commonwealth; Bloomsburg also is the location of one of America's great carpet mills. For hill or flatland beauty, few counties compare with Columbia ... Profile Rock, near Catawissa, has watched the mountains beyond for years; Mountour Ridge which follows the Susquehanna River was for years noted for its deposits of iron ore. The beautiful Susquehanna River flows the length of the county--there is much to be seen in Columbia County along the old Wyoming Indian Trail. And a hospitality among people, which I have rarely seen excelled in the Commonwealth. They are warm, wonderful, softspoken, hard working--providing one of our best labor markets. "Hail Columbia" -- not only a song after which it was named -- but a greeting we can give to one of Pennsylvania's areas of warm hospitality. Hail Columbia!
