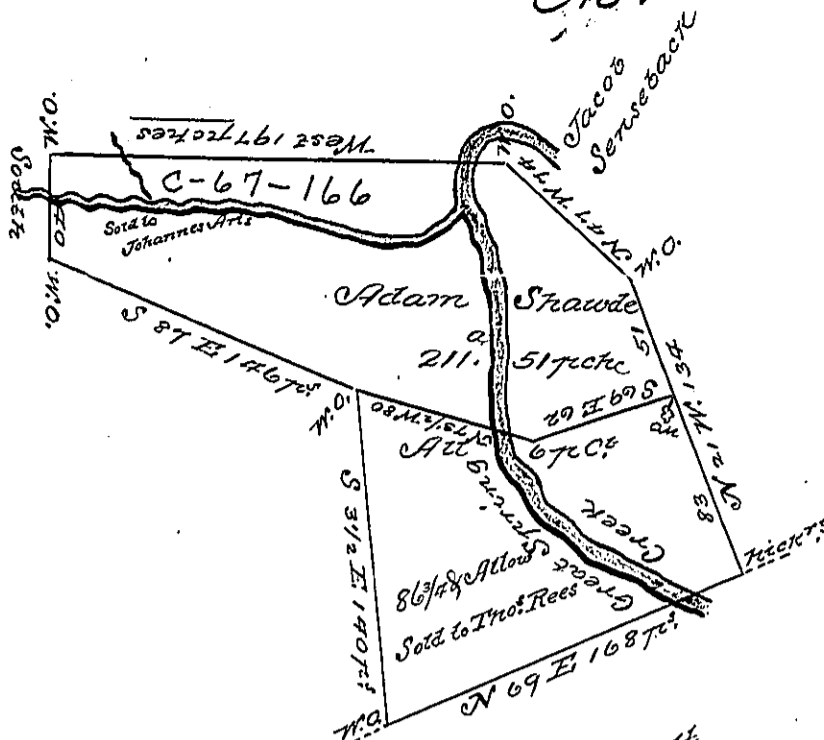

In Pursuance of a Warrant bearing Date the 22nd Day of November Anno Dom. 1736 surveyed unto Adam Shauwe a Certain Tract of Land situated on Great Spring Creek in the County of Lancaster Beginning at a White Oak Tree marked for a Corner of this and Jacob Senebuck's Land Thence extending by Vacant Land the four Courses and Distances next following viz West one hundred and ninety seven feet to a white Oak, South Forty feet to a white Oak, South 67 Deg: East one hundred and forty six feet to a white Oak and South 3 1/2 Deg: East one hundred and forty feet to a white Oak Thence by John Wyatt's Land North 69 Deg: East one hundred and sixty eight feet to a Hickory Thence by vacant land North 21 Deg: West one hundred & thirty four feet to a white Oak Thence by Vacant Land and Lands of Jacob Senebuck North 47 Deg: West seventy four feet to the Place of Beginning containing Two hundred and Eleven Acres and Fifty one feet Beside the usual allowance of 6 1/2 ft for Roads &c Surveyed the 18th Day of July A.D: 1737

Adam Shauwe has divided this Tract into two parts one of which he Sold to Thomas Rees who paying the Consider: money due for the same to James Steel & Rowing A Shauwe's Debt a Receipt was made into the Secretarys Office 6th of March 1738 fees paid
