



In pursuance of an order of the Honorable the Board of Property in the Case, Dixon vs Chambers, appointing us the Subscribers to survey and lay out a reasonable quantity of Timber Land to accommodate the Improvement of said Dixon, and with as little prejudice as may be to the Surveys of Chambers, we met June 26th 1792 on the Lands in question, situate in Fannet Township in the County of Franklin, and on viewing the Premises, and considering the Improvements of Dixon and Surveys of Chambers, have unanimously agreed and adjudged, that in order to accommodate the Improvement of George Dixon with Timber Land agreeable to the said order, there should be Surveyed and laid out for him the said Dixon, on his warrant dated the 13th of October 1790. the Tract of Land above described, including his Improvements and such quantity of Timber Land adjoining to accommodate the same, as, in our opinion, is just and reasonable, Containing in the whole two hundred and fifty eight acres 135 perches and allowance, and which the Surveyor of the District hath now surveyed & laid out accordingly.
