In pursuance of a Warrant from the Proprietary Commission^{rs} dated the first day of December 1726. I survey'd the Jacob Litzemore a certain tract or parcel of Land situate on a branch of Paxton Creek in the County of Lancaster. Beginning at a Black Oak on the North side of the said Branch thence crossing the same South 230 paces by Vacant Land to a Hickery, Thence West 66 paces by Vacant Land 200 paces to a Black Oak, Thence North by Vacant Land 8 paces to a post, thence N. E. by N. by Vacant Land 161 paces to a Black Oak, Thence N. W. by W by Vacant Land 162 paces to a Chestnut Oak, Thence West by Vacant Land 66 paces to a White Oak, Thence W. S. W. by Vacant Land 94 paces to the place of Beginning, Containing 375 acres and the arrow = area of six acres 10 Cents. Survey'd the 11th day of June 1730,
