



A draft of a tract of land situate in bells' Valley on A Branch of Sideling hill Creek in Hopewell township Bedford County containing Two Hundred & forty five Acres & Allowance of six percent for roads &c. Surveyed for Robert Allison the 7<sup>th</sup> day of May 1767 on Order N<sup>o</sup> 251 dated the 1<sup>st</sup> day of August 1766.

The green lines represent the draft of A tract of Land Surveyed for Joseph Alexander In pursuance of A Warrant dated the 27<sup>th</sup> day of June 1786 --- This tract interferes One Hundred & ninety four Acres with the Robert Allison tract - Joseph Alexander conveyed to Alexander who also purchased the Robert Allison tract at sales of County Commissioners for taxes - he devised 100 acres to his daughter Sarah who married Benjamin Bradley the present owner. The residue of the tract he devised to his daughter Christiana and John Wishard - Christiana conveyed her Interest to John Wishard the present owner.

N<sup>o</sup> 1 represented by the broken lines is a draft of A tract of land Surveyed for Hugh Alexander In pursuance of A Warrant dated the 6<sup>th</sup> day of February 1786. This tract interferes Twenty five Acres & twenty eight perches with the Robert Allison tract. Hugh Alexander conveyed to William Alexander whose Executor conveyed to Henry Giles who conveyed to Ebenezer Oakman the present owner.

N<sup>o</sup> 2 represented by Broken lines is a draft of A tract of land Surveyed for James Binghamst on Warrant dated the 15<sup>th</sup> day of June 1774. This tract interferes fourteen Acres & one Hundred & twenty nine perches with the Robert Allison tract. Abraham Kerns Bought this tract from the Commissioners of Bedford County for Taxes and now claims the same
