

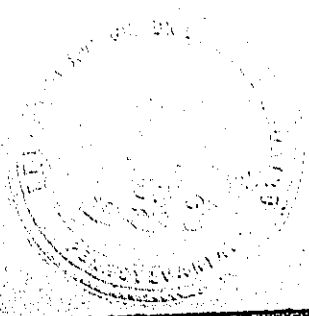
In pursuance of a Warrant dated the 2<sup>nd</sup> day of November 1850 Surveyed the 4<sup>th</sup> day of November 1850 unto David Warren the above mentioned Tract of land being part of the Island commonly called Windmill Island which lies opposite to or nearly to Cedar (or South) Street in the City of Philadelphia containing about 200 feet front upon the River opposite to the City of Philadelphia and District of Southwark and extending between parallel lines across the Island being bounded on the North and South by a Survey made the 14<sup>th</sup> day of Aug<sup>t</sup> 1849 to George N. Tatham and on the East and West by low Water mark of the River Delaware Beginning at Low Water mark of the said River Delaware thence by land surveyed to said George N. Tatham S 89° 20' 6" 23:55 Perches to low water mark of said River Delaware thence by low water mark S 11° 15' N 12:5 Perches thence by land surveyed to said George N. Tatham N 89° 20' W 17:9 Perches to Low Water of the said River Delaware thence along Low Water mark N 38° 55' W 0:47 Perches and thence N 13° 45' W 12:31 perches to the place of Beginning containing One acre and Ninety One Perches.
