



Subsidiary part in Lallimore Township, Adams County and part in Middleton Township, Cumberland County  
Surveyed October 17<sup>th</sup> 1806 in pursuance of a warrant Granted to George Brandon Senr for 100<sup>ac</sup> dated September 3<sup>rd</sup> 1743.

N.B. The warrant by which I surveyed the above land calls for Land in Manchester Township adjoining lands of James McGrew. Manchester is the name of a Township near York. It's possible it might have been very extensive at that time, there is no land adjoining that was ever owned by James McGrew, but one of that name lived within 2 or 3 miles of it, and the settlements at that time being so few it might be the land intended by the warrant and Brandon laying on it in the year 1750 or 1751 is pretty good evidence of it, which you may see by the annexed Deposition. The part marked A is claimed by John Love and Surveyed to him by warrant dated about the year 1794. I was prevented by force from surveying the line N<sup>o</sup> 5 and therefore laid it down by protraction.

To Sam'l Cochran Esq<sup>r</sup>

Adams County, D.S. Personally appeared before the subscriber one of the Justices of the peace for said County, James Moorhead Senr who being duly sworn according to law deposeth and saith that in the year seventeen hundred & fifty or seventeen hundred & fifty one he deponent assisted Francis McCullouch to make a Survey round the tract of land <sup>laid</sup> down for George Brandon Senr upon a warrant which the Brandon had obtained that they began at a Spanish oak where the black lines N<sup>o</sup> 1 & N<sup>o</sup> 8 intersect each other as here laid down on the adjoining plot and ran (the deponent carrying one end of the chain) the black line N<sup>o</sup> 8 the dotted line N<sup>o</sup> 9 & the black line N<sup>o</sup> 5 to a Chestnut tree that when they came to s<sup>d</sup> Chestnut tree the s<sup>d</sup> Brandon sent deponent for liquor, and told him that they would go on & the deponent should come against that corner & follow the line after them which they would mark, that he did as directed and followed them along dotted line N<sup>o</sup> 10 to a Chestnut at the end of said line where he overtook them and continued with them until they ran 12 rods the lines reperesented on the adjoining plot by N<sup>o</sup> 2 & 1 to a Spanish oak the place of beginning that they marked the lines round the tract as the went, that there is several trees standing yet on Black line N<sup>o</sup> 5 which were marked, then particularly two white oaks & a pine, that the said George Brandon had cleared a piece of ground and made some nails (before Francis McCullouch made the s<sup>d</sup> Survey) north of the dotted line N<sup>o</sup> 12 on the piece of land now claimed by John Love & within the bounds of McCullouch's Survey about where the letter A is placed on the adjoining plot & that he understood that McCullouch was sent by George Stephenson D.S. to survey said land in pursuance of the s<sup>d</sup> Brandon's warrant & further saith not.
