The above Draft represents Lands in Lewisburg Township in the County of Franklin claimed and in possession of the Heirs of James McKee & Gause Morrow. The division or common boundary between them being disputed. A review of the lines & places relative thereto has been made this 10<sup>th</sup> day of March 1798 and their lines reviewed it was not found to interfere. The top of a dividing ridge between the Waters represented above is said to have been the old division agreed to between the first owners of said two Tracts. The survey lines along the said ridge do vary from side to side along the top of the same in about the same proportion as is represented by the above lines in the Draft which run with and pass over the Yellow marked space which represents the top of the ridge aforesaid. Purs the Warrant for McKees side of the ridge is for a less quantity of Land than is there situated & that for Morrow's side is for a greater quantity than he can find unclaimed by others on his own side of said ridge. But the Survey on John McKee's Warrant (by cutting & counting the marks) is found to have been made as above represented by William Lyon (Assistant to John Armstrong D<sup>r</sup>) on the 17<sup>th</sup> January 1763 on Warrant dated 3<sup>rd</sup> June 1762. And on the 27<sup>th</sup> October 1772 a warrant was granted to Gause Morrow pursuant to which on the 14<sup>th</sup> June 1785 the above represented Survey was made Officially for said Morrow.
