



In Pursuance of a Warrant dated the 16th day of April 1776 requiring me to survey and lay out for the Rector Vestry Men and Church Wardens of the German Lutheran Congregation in and near the City of Philadelphia Two Lots of Ground in the Square between Seventh and Eighth Streets and Sassafras and Vine Streets in the aforesaid City one of them for a Burying Place, and the other for a Parsonage house and School-House. I do hereby Certify that I have on the 16th day of Septem^r 1776. Surveyed for the said Congregation the said Two lots agreeable to the Directions in the said Warrant, that the Lot for the Burying Place is situate in the Square aforesaid and Contains in Breadth East and West on the North side of Sassafras Street Two hundred and fifty Two feet, & in length North and South on the East side of Eighth Street four hundred and Ninety three feet. Bounded Southward by Sassafras Street Westward by Eighth Street to the distance of one hundred and forty feet from the South side of Vine Street Northward by Vacant Ground, and the other of said Lots laid out for a Parsonage House and School-house at the distance of 140 feet from the said South side of Vine Street, and Eastward by the Public Square, and that the other Lot for the Parsonage-house and School-house is situate on the aforesaid Square and joins the last described Lot Containing in Breadth East and West on the South side of Vine Street, Eighty feet, and in Length North and South One hundred and forty feet, Bounded Northward by Vine Street, Westward by Vacant Ground, South by the last described Lot for a Burying Place and Eastward by the Public Square at the distance of one hundred and forty four feet from the West side of Seventh Street.
