



Explanatory notes; The black lines in the above Diagram Represent a Survey which was made in pursuance of a Warrant granted to John Baynton and Samuel Wharton Dated the 28<sup>th</sup> of July 1766. The two Surveys enclosed within the Yellow lines was made the 29<sup>th</sup> or 30<sup>th</sup> day of October 1766 In pursuance of two Orders of Survey One of them granted to Nathaniel Johns the other to Richard Johns Dated Respectively the 1<sup>st</sup> of August 1766 Both of which Rights have succeeded against the Right of John Baynton & Samuel Wharton By a Due Course of Law had in our County. The piece marked with the letter A Contains sixty four acres 128 perches & the piece marked with the letter B Contains one hundred ninety five acres 75 perches & allowance. These two pieces are all that is now left of the Survey of John Baynton & Samuel Wharton which is not included in older or better titles (or Survey). The above Diagram made from an actual survey & examination of the lines on the ground the 30<sup>th</sup> of May 1828 In pursuance of an Order of the Board of Property dated the 6<sup>th</sup> May 1828. The original Survey of the John Baynton & Samuel Wharton was said to contain 599<sup>as</sup> & allowance Situate in Wagon mark township Huntingdon County
