



Draught of a tract of land, Situate in, (formerly Derry Township Cumberland County) now Wayne Township, Mifflin County, which appears to have been Surveyed 1st March 1775, as above shewn by N^o 1 - In pursuance of a Warrant to Samuel Holliday dated 25th October 1774, for 100^{ac}, and appears to contain 70^{ac} 97^{pc} & all^{ac} N^o 2 shows an addition said to have been made 24th May 1814, by Mich^l M. Monahan late D.S. - Including part of a Survey made 26th April 1803 on application N^o 4859, by John McCormick, dated 18th March 1768, shown by dotted lines through addition N^o 2 - and part of a Survey made 12th Nov^r. 1824, In pursuance of a Warrant to Dorcus Stackpole, dated 3^d March 1823 Shown by dotted lines all round as above; Examined on the ground 16th June 1830 for Sam^l Holliday the younger, and appears to contain one hundred nine acres, one hundred eight perches & all^{ac}; total amount of his claim on Warrant to Samuel Holliday of 25 October 1774 as above stated &c -
