A Draft of a Tract or Parcel of Land situate in Newton Township in the County of Cumberland Containing in the whole three hundred & ninety five Acres & 51 Perches and an Allowance of Six p Cent for Roads &c for which the following Warrants & Orders of Survey have been obtained Viz

Order to William Laughlin for 200 Acres in Hopewell Township Cumberland County bounded on the North by John Townen on the West by John Thomson, on the South by Joseph Mc Guffog on the East by James Laughlin No. 2067 Dated Dec^r 3rd 1766

Warrant to Joseph Mc Guffog for 150 Acres including an Improvement joining Lands of Patrick Mc Farland on the North by James Laughlin, John Carson and Lands late of John Thomson decd in Newton Township in the County of Cumberland - Dated 7th May 1785

Warrant to James Laughlin for 500 Acres including an Improvement joining Lands of Patrick Mc Farland on the East, William Laughlin on the South, the Heirs of John Thomson on the West, John Townen on the North west, and Solomon Lightcap on the North in Newton Township in the County of Cumberland - Dated 20th May 1785 - The whole claimed by James Laughlin under the Application in the Name of William Laughlin & the Warrant in his own Name - And all that part of the same Land lying Southward of the dotted Line, including nearly 150 Acres & Allowance, claimed by Joseph Mc Guffog under his Warrant aforesaid - Survey & Eng^d 26th 1785

To B. An actual Survey of the above dotted Line (Dotted N^o) taken Oct^r 25th 1787, it is found to cut through the Fields of James Laughlin in the manner above represented, taking off in the whole about Nine Acres & an half N^o 16.
