



To the Honorable Board of Property of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania —

In pursuance of an Order from your Honorable Board dated the fourth day of September 1794 requiring us to repair to two certain Islands in the River Susquehanna opposite to the lands & late conveyed to Christian Herr by Mackey McCullough and George McCullough the Younger in Drumore Township in the County of Lancaster which he the said Christian Herr hath applied for —

We beg leave to report to your Honorable Board that this day we went to the premises and after making the several enquiries enjoined by said Order to find that there has been Improvement made thereon by the said McCulloughs and by them transferred to him the said Christian Herr, that from the best information taken from the Neighbours no Survey has been made for the proprietaries before the fourth day of July 1776 that there is some valuable Timber growing on the premises that the distance of the larger Island from the main Land is about fifty perches and that of the smaller about thirty that part of the Soil is susceptible of Cultivation although poor and that no Fishery is erected on either of the premises — A five shillings

Having taken those several Circumstances into our Consideration We do value the said Islands to be worth the Sum of Three pounds for each Acre contained in the Draughts of the Survey
hereunto annexed all which humbly submitted to your Honorable Board Witness our Hands this Fifth Day of May A.D. 1795 —
