


Notes of George Wear's survey

Surveyed 2<sup>nd</sup> February 1842 to Charles & Thomas Campbell the above described piece of land containing Eighteen acres and three quarters and allowance of six per cent with an improvement of about two or two and one half acres cleared and fenced situate adjoining lands originally surveyed to William Findley, George Wear, Francis McConnell, Thomas Bell and Blacklick creek as above described in Blacklick Township Indiana County By Virtue of a Warrant granted to Charles Campbell señor dated 23<sup>rd</sup> day of Dec<sup>r</sup> 1824.

To Jacob Gallade Esq<sup>r</sup> Surveyor General.

N.B. There is filed in this office a draught of survey of 25<sup>th</sup> Oct<sup>r</sup> 1826 (including all of the above described piece of land) By Virtue of the above recited warrant with a note endorsed on said draught "the return of this survey was sent back from the Surveyor Generals Office with these words endorsed" "Part of the within previously surveyed on older warrant thereto cannot be accepted unless satisfactory reason given" It appears according to papers on file that George Wear obtained a warrant for three acres of land dated 9<sup>th</sup> December 1822 and survey made 24<sup>th</sup> of April 1823, and Charles Campbell señor set up a claim and in making his survey 25<sup>th</sup> Oct<sup>r</sup> 1826 took in all of Weats survey outside the William Findley line and extended 29 perches below Wear's survey. But now his sons Charles and Thomas in making the above survey go no further than to Wear's survey leaving it out and all below it that was included in the first survey.

P.S. According to draught on file the first or 25<sup>th</sup> Oct<sup>r</sup> 1826 survey when Wear's was taken in 17<sup>a</sup> & allowance. But now leaving Wear's out 18 3/4<sup>a</sup> & allowance the readiest apology that I can make is that the land in these parts appears to be growing.
