



By virtue of a special appointment of the Surveyor General of Pennsylvania dated the 5<sup>th</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup> 1818 and in pursuance of an order of the Board of Property dated the 5<sup>th</sup> August 1818 Surveyed for Philip Denny the above described tract of land situate in Augusta & Shamokin Townships Northumberland County containing one hundred thirty nine Acres one hundred & forty perches & allowance of six per cent part of 298<sup>ac</sup> 119<sup>per</sup> on Application of Joseph Shippen Jun<sup>r</sup> dated 3<sup>d</sup> April 1769 & 130<sup>ac</sup>. Surveyed the 22 January 1819 by Thomas Smith D.S.

The N.O. (C) is standing regularly marked for a corner, Blazed counts 49 years. The N.O. (B) is also standing regularly marked with corner marks. From the N.O. (C) the whole northern Boundary of Shippen's survey is well marked. The dotted line (E) is also well marked, said to have been run by W. Mc Clay or D. Montgomery; a N.O. tree which I apprehend to be the N.E. corner of A. Hunter's survey stands on this line Blazed on the West side and counts 25 years agreeing with Hunter's survey, it is notched on the South side & marked on the East side showing the line to continue. The Black line is also well marked and is that to which S. Denny claims, said to have been run by S. Snyder late deputy surveyor in subdividing Mitmans lands under whom Denny claims. From Blazing it appears to have been run 16 years ago; and it is probable that McPherson's survey was made to join this line as his distance falls short by 5 or 6 perches to Mc Clay's line.

The red line is that run by Mr. Roachyeller and issues from a N.O. standing on the line N 1/2 N 79, and is seven perches North of the corner made on Snyder's line; this N.O. is probably more than 300 years old, Bark Rough & fixed and is destitute of corner marks it stands near a Road & has been Blazed on the N. S. & E. sides the West side has been blazed, but no marks appear on the wood.

IN TESTIMONY that the above is a copy of the original remaining on file in the Department of Internal Affairs of Pennsylvania, made conformably to an Act of Assembly approved the 16th day of February, 1833, I have hereunto set my Hand and caused the Seal of said Department to be affixed at Harrisburg, this seventeenth day of January 1907.
